Acceptable topics MUST be directly related to the Course Objectives for PSYC 121. To complete a journal article successfully, you will:

- 1) Summarize the main issue or question that the research investigates.
- 2) Outline the method(s) used.
- 3) Explain the results found.
- 4) Identify 3 follow-up questions raised by the results of the article.

3. Required Out of Class Assignment

Sample

Listen to (and/or view the transcript of) the Science Vs podcast "The Science of Being Transgender." As you listen/read, take notes and answer the following questions:

- 1) What makes us the gender we are?
- 2) How much is it influenced by biology vs.upbringing?
- 3) If a child says they are transgender, what should we do? Did anything (the research and historical information presented) particularly surprise you? Why or why not?
- 4) What can we do to ensure the safety and wellbeing of trans people?

Be prepared to discuss the podcast and your answers with the class.
