ABOUT FLORA & ULYSSES

"Can a little squirrel change the human heart? After getting sucked up by a vacuum cleaner, a (now hairless) squirrel is rescued by Flora Belle Buckman, a 10-year-old self-proclaimed cynic. She names him Ulysses and discovers he has been reborn a superhero. Indeed, this once average squirrel can suddenly understand Flora, fly, and even write poetry. Together they embark on an adventure full of quirky characters and bursting with heart."

ROLES AVAILABLE FOR FLORA & ULYSSES

This production is committed to diverse, inclusive casting. Every auditionee will be considered for every role (see list of roles below), unless you designate differently on your audition form.

FLORA – a 10 year old girl. Loves comic books and crime. Self-proclaimed cynic.

Tootie Tickham – Her neighbor – Loves poetry and takes in her great nephew William Spiver, even though he is a bit "neurotic"

Donald Tickham – Tootie's Husband – who thinks a good present for his wife is a vacuum.

Ulysses – A Squirrel (the actor will voice the squirrel's thoughts, and puppeteer the squirrel) Turns into a superhero squirrel who can write poetry and fly!

Phyllis Buckman – Flora's mother. Writes romance novels. Going through a divorce with George. A little pre-occupied with getting rid of Ulysses and her typewriter.

George Buckman – Flora's father – Sad Dad, cries a lot. Is a little robotic with his pleasantries. Follows Phyllis' lead, until he sees Ulysses fly at donut world. Then we see his true self!

William Spiver – an eleven-year-old boy – Wears dark glasses and says he is blind due to trauma.

Dr. Meescham – an elderly woman – psychologist and George's neighbor. Uses tales of a strange fictional land to try to connect with Flora. George comes over and cries on her couch a lot.

Rita-the waitress at Do-nut world – Gets nosy about what Flora has with her. Wears big hair and a nametag that says RITA!

Ernie – the cook at Do-nut world – Brandishes a spatula to take out Ulysses.

Mr. Klaus – a cat (puppet) - Attacks anyone in sight. Stalks the hallways at George's apt building.

Alfred T. Slipper - aka The Amazing Incandesto; looks a lot like George Buckman

MONOLOGUES

Ulysses – His heart was beating very fast. Something had happened, but what? He couldn't think. He was too hungry to think. he lifts his nose and sniffs. Cheese? Something Cheesy. Cheese puff! He gobbles the cheese puff greedily. More! He is intrigued by the typewriter and slowly tries to type. He worked slowly. It took half the night. Was he fighting evil? Who could say? But as he worked, his whiskers trembled and his heart sang.

Mrs. Tickham – The squirrel. The squirrel wrote...poetry. Ulysses, I too am a great lover of poetry, and what you wrote moves me. I'd like to share a small poem I have committed to memory, by a great poet names Rainer Maria Rilke. Would you like to hear it? "You, sent out beyon your recall,/go to the limits of your longing./ Embody me. / Flare up like flame / and make big shadows I can move in."

Flora – <u>The Criminal Element</u> says criminals are everywhere. And *anyone* can be a criminal. It says, "the human heart is like a deep, dark river. If we are not careful, that river can carry us along in its hidden currents of want and anger and need, and transform each of us into the very criminal we fear." Do you think that's true, Pop?

William Spiver – Flora Belle, what a melodious name. I cannot see. Would it trouble you terribly, Flora Belle, if I put my hand on your shoulder so you can guide me? The world is a treacherous place when you can't see. I am eleven, but I have an old soul. I'm small for my age. Excessive trauma can hinder growth. The universe is a random place, Flora Belle.

PRODUCTION DETAILS

Rehearsals will begin the week of February 12th and will generally rehearse Tuesday –Thursday 4-7. Longer rehearsals (5:30-9:30) will be required closer to the show date. Shows will be the weekend of April 26th We will also perform 4 daytime performances on April 25, 26, 28 & 29 from 8am-12.

Monologues: I am willing to consider gender bending roles! Memorize any monologue!

Borachio: Go then, find me a meet hour to draw Don Pedro and the Count Claudio alone, tell them that you know that Hero loves me. They will scarcely believe this without trial. Offer them instances which shall bear no less likelihood than to see me court her privately; hear me call Margaret Hero; and bring them to see this the very night before the intended wedding, and there shall appear such seeming truths of Hero's disloyalty, that jealousy shall be called assurance, and all the preparation overthrown.

Benedick: This can be no trick. The conference was sadly borne, they have the truth of this from Hero, they seem to pity the lady. It seems her affections have the full bent. Love me? Why it must be requited. I hear how I am censured: they say I will bear myself proudly if I perceive the love come from her; they say too, that she will rather die than give any sign of affection. I did never think to marry. I must not seem proud. They say the lady is fair, 'tis a truth, I can bear them witness; and virtuous, 'tis so, I cannot reprove it; and wise, but for loving me. By my troth, it is no addition to her wit, nor no great argument of her folly, for I will be horribly in love with her.

Hero: Good Margaret, run thee to the parlour; There shalt thou find my cousin Beatrice proposing with the prince and Claudio. Whisper her ear, and tell her I and your mother walk here about, and that our whole discourse is all of her. Say that thou overheardst us, and bid her steal where she can hide her to listen our purpose. This is thy office, bear thee well in it, and leave us alone. Now, Ursula, when Beatrice doth come, our talk must only be of Benedick. When I do name him, let it be thy part to praise him more than ever man did merit. My talk to thee must be how Benedick is sick in love with Beatrice. Of this matter, is little Cupid's crafty arrow made, that only wounds by hearsay.

Claudio: Sweet prince, you learn me noble thankfulness. There, Leonato, take her back again, give not this rotten orange to your friend, She's but the sign and semblance of her honour. Behold how like a maid she blushes here! O what authority and show of truth can cunning sin cover itself withal! Comes not that blood as modest evidence to witness simple virtue? Would you not swear all you that see her, that she were a maid by these exterior shows? But she is none. She knows the hear of a luxurious bed. Her blush is guiltiness, not modesty.

Beatrice: You dare easier be friends with me, than fight with mine enemy. Is he not approved in the height a villain, that hath slandered, scorned, dishonoured my kinswoman? O that I were a man! What, bear her in hand until they come to take hands, and then with public accusation, uncovered slander, unmitigated rancour? O God that I were a man! I would eat his heart in the marketplace. Sweet Hero, she is wronged, she is slandered, she is undone. Princes and counties! Surely a princely testimony, a goodly count, Count Comfect, a sweet gallant surely; O that I were a man for his sake! Or that I had any friend would be a man for my sake. He is not as valiant as Hercules that only tells a lie and swears it. I cannot be a man with wishing, therefore I will die a woman with grieving.

Dogberry: Dost thou not suspect my place? Dost thou not suspect my years? O that he were here to write me down an ass! But masters, remember that I am an ass. Though it be not written down, yet forget not that I am an ass. No, thou villain, thou art full of piety as shall be proved upon thee by good witness. I am a wise fellow, and which is more an officer, and which is more a householder, and which is more as pretty a piece of flesh as any in Messina, and one that knows the law, go to; and a rich fellow enough, go to; and a fellow that hat had losses, and one that hath two coats, and every thing handsome about him. Bring him away. O that I had been writ down an ass!
